### Paired reading



Paired reading is a way of supporting children with their confidence and enjoyment in reading whilst giving them a chance to generalise the skills they have been learning. They will have the opportunity to apply their reading skills in new and different contexts with support from you to be successful.

#### Think about:

- ✓ DO praise your child and name the things they're doing well.
- ✓ DO really share the book- let them lead on the things they can do and make this a positive, enjoyable moment in the day.
- ✓ DO talk about the book and pictures as you read.

#### Try not to:

- Make them struggle over a word instead, give them a few seconds, then say the word. The reader repeats the word and then you carry on reading together.
- Choose the book for them your child will soon learn what they like and let you know their interests.

Books: Let your child choose (even if it seems too hard).

Time: Every day for 5-10 minutes.

**Place:** Somewhere quiet and comfortable.



#### Step 1- Reading together

- · Before you start, agree on a secret signal together (knock, clap, squeeze).
- · Start reading the words aloud together. Match your pace to your child's reading.
- · Your child might start by reading the words just after you that's ok!
- · It might help for your child to point to the words.
- Use lots of praise and positive encouragement for their reading, even if they're using clues from you to read.

#### Step 2- Reading alone

- When the reader is confident, they use the 'secret signal' to show you they want to read on their own. Let them decide this. Stop reading when they signal.
- If they make a mistake, or get stuck on a word, <u>give them 3-4 seconds</u> to correct it.
- After this time, <u>say the word</u> and get them to repeat it don't ask them to sound out or break it down.
- <u>Carry on reading together</u> until the reader signals to read on their own again.

## FOR CHILDREN WITH NEW DEVICES

Christmas is almost upon us once again, and soon some lucky children will be excitedly tearing the wrapping off a new mobile phone, tablet or games console. For some of them, it will be the first time they've owned a device that connects them to the online world. Even for older children, a new device means new corners of the digital landscape to explore – and, unfortunately, new risks to be aware of.

We've put together our top tips so that you can guide your young ones in enjoying their new digital gifts safely and responsibly throughout the year to come. Merry Christmas!

#### ALWAYS SET A PASSWORD

If your child's new device has a password protection feature, use iti I'Il help to keep their private information safe and will deny others access to their device without permission. Your children's passwords should be something memorable to them – but something which other people can't guess (it's also a good idea for parents to write it down in case it gets forgotten!).

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## 4. KEEP NUMBERS\*

Make sure your child understands that they should never share their phone number with someone they don't know or accept a friend requestfrom them. They should also appreciate that it's a good idea to mainly keep their device out of sight, never lend it to a stranger, and never put it down somewhere that other people could steal it or take it to use without asking.

#### 7. EXPLAIN SECURE WIFI NETWORKS

Your home WiFi is protected by a password that only your family knows, whereas public networks (like those found in coffee shops, for example) can be accessed by anyone. It's important that your child grasps this difference because, if they're using a portable device on an unsecured network, then a hacker could access their personal information without them even knowing.

## 10. TURN LOCATION

It's safest to disable the device's location services (if it's a portable device) so your child doesn't inadvertently make other people aware of where they are. You can usually do this via the device's privacy control settings. Turning location settings off not only means your child's whereabouts can't be tracked by others, it also significantly extends battery life.

## 2. SET UP

This really is an essential when your child gets a new device, so the y're protected from the outset. Most phones, tablets and consoles allow you to customise their settings to determine which games your child can play, how they can communicate (and who with), what content they can access and so on. It will give you peace of mind that they can't inadvertently do something they shouldn't.

#### 5. HAVE 'THE MONEY CONVERSATION'

Before your children start using their new device in earnest, talk to them about in-app purchases and other ways that money might be spert through their device. Once they understand, you might wantto agree on a spending limit and reassure them that they can come to you if they're uncertain, or if they have made a purchase by accident.

## 8. SCREEN TIME

Using a device for too long, especially just before bed, can interfere with a child's sleep quality and reduce their concentration and overall enthusiasm. It mightbe helpful to agree on certain times of day when they don't use their device. Most devices' settings let you specify a screen-time limit, helping your child to stay fresh and focused in order to perform well at school.

#### STAY AWARE OF THE SURROUNDINGS

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It's quite common to see adults not looking where they're going while engrossed in their phone. Children are even more easily distracted. In some cases, children have been hit by cars or cyclists because they were staring at their device and lost track of where they were. Remind your child that screens and walking don't mix. If they need to use their device, they should stop in a safe place first.

#### B. PAY ATTENTION TO AGE RATINGS

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One of the first things children want to do with any new device is play games and explore apps. Before they download anything or install a new console game, check its age rating. Many popular games and apps have content that's not suitable for younger ages. The safest long-term solution is to adjust the device's settings so they can only download and use games and apps appropriate for their age.

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## 6. DISCOURAGE

Of course, children who've just got a new device will naturally want to spend as much time on it as possible. But whether they're zapping bad guys, watching videos or connecting with friends, it's easy for them to get attached very quickly. Gently remind them that having family time, going outdoors and getting some exercise are still fun, too. And the device will be there when they get back.

#### 9. ONLY PAIR WITH KNOWN BLUETOOTH DEVICES

Your child may want to connect to another device via Bluetooth, so they can listen to music wirelessly or share pictures and videos with nearby friends. But if they use Bluetooth to link with a device that they don't know, they're at risk of a stranger being able to see their personal information or having someone transmit a virus onto their device.

12. BE THERE IF THEY

Even when you've made a device as secure as you can, there's still a possibility of your child seeing something that bothers them, or some one they don't know attempting to contact them. If this happens, listen to their concerns, empathise and reassure them. Once they've explained what happened, you can decide if you should take further action like blocking or reporting another user.



## What's been happening in Reception ...

We have had so much fun exploring different heroes in out topic, Anyone Can be Hero. We have battled the Evil Pea while reading Supertato, and considered how we can aim for the stars and achieve the impossible while reading Think Big.

We had lots of fun walking up the High Street to visit Boz's Fruit and Vegetable Market to choose our own potatoes, we later used these in school to make our very own 'Supertatoes' helping us defeat the Evil Pea. We used our detective skills to locate the missing soft toys that the Evil Pea had hidden away, following the clues he had left behind. We also utilised our detective skills while exploring the tragedy of cracked eggs in the Reception area, considering many different reasons why Humpty Dumpty was left in so many pieces.

We have also spent lots of our PSHE time considering different ways we can be kind to others, even when people are different to us and that it is important to celebrate our differences.

In our Maths learning, we have been exploring the composition of numbers to 5, relating this to the mathematical vocabulary of parts and wholes. We have also begun to compare quantities, thinking about which quantity is greater and less than another.

### What's been happening in Year 1

The children have been thoroughly enjoying our topic, 'The Carnival of the Animals'. After reading the story 'My Perfect Pet', the children went on to write descriptive sentences about what their perfect pet would be like. We also explored rhyming words and created our own riddles.

Our English and RE learning in the last 2 weeks of term will be focused on the story of the birth of Jesus and learning about the key people involved, which will help the children's understanding of the story's events as we act out the story.


In Maths this month we have continued to explore addition and subtraction, using the language of more than and less than. The children have been working out 1 more and 1 less than a given number and have been practising subtraction methods using the concrete, pictorial and abstract approach. We will now be focusing on shape until the end of term. At home, you can go on a 2D and 3D shape hunt.

This month, the children will be zooming in on the physical structure of a variety of common animals (fish, amphibians, reptiles, birds and mammals including pets). They will then identify, name, draw and label the basic parts of the human body and say which part of the body is associated with each sense At home, please continue to read with your child each day and record this in the reading diary. In the reading diary you will also see a list of Year 1 words that children should be able to read on sight and spell correctly by the end of the year.

## Phonics

The children carried out a Phonics assessment last week and will be revising sounds in their groups that they need further practice with. These sounds can be found inside your child's reading diary.
