Online Safety

Be Smart and Stay Safe Online!

Tips for Primary School Children and Their Families The internet is a fun and exciting place where we can play games, watch videos, and learn new things. However, just like we learn to stay safe in the real world, it is important to stay safe online too! Here are some simple tips to help you and your child use the internet wisely:

1. Keep Your Password a Secret!

A password is like a secret key that protects your accounts. Remind your child never to tell anyone his or her password except a trusted adult (like mum or dad). Help them choose a password that is not easy to guess — no names or birthdays!

2. Don't Share Personal Information

Teach children never to share their full name, where they live, their school name, or phone number online. If someone asks for this kind of information, the best thing to do is tell a trusted adult right away.

3. Be Careful What You Search

Sometimes we look things up online to learn or for fun — and that is great! But, not everything on the internet is safe for kids. Encourage your child to ask before searching and use kid-friendly websites or search engines with adult supervision.

4. Stop and Think Before You Click

It is easy to click on things that look fun or exciting — but some links and ads can be tricky or even harmful. Remind your child to always ask an adult before clicking on anything new or unfamiliar.

5. Talk About What You See and Do Online

Let your child know they can always talk to you or a teacher if something online makes them feel worried, confused, or upset. Keeping the conversation open helps children make safe choices and feel supported. Working Together at school, we learn about how to be safe, kind, and smart online. You can help at home by chatting regularly about what your child is doing online and setting some simple rules for internet time.

Let's all work together to keep our students safe, happy, and confident online!

The summer holidays are a well-deserved break for students and their families. It's a time to relax, enjoy fun activities and take a step back from the daily grind of schoolwork. However, it's essential to ensure that students continue with some form of consistent learning during these six weeks to avoid the negative effects of the summer slide.

Strategies to Prevent the Summer Slide

The good news is that research indicates even a small amount of consistent learning over the summer can mitigate the effects of the summer slide. Studies show that just 2-3 hours of learning per week can be effective in preventing learning loss.

Encourage reading: Role model and encourage regular reading. Find books that interest your child and visit the local library. For reluctant readers, consider comic books, graphic novels, or audiobooks. All forms of reading help improve spelling, writing, and comprehension skills across various subjects, not just English.

Stay active and engaged: Keep your child active by visiting places where they can learn and explore, such as museums, galleries, and outdoor experiences. Participate in local community activities that stimulate curiosity and learning.

Challenge with brain teasers: Encourage your child to engage in brain teasers and puzzles to enhance problem-solving skills and memory. These activities can be both fun and educational.





The Summer Reading Challenge is back for another summer of fun! This year's theme 'Story Garden – Adventures in Nature and the Great Outdoors' promises to inspire children to tap into a world of imagination through reading, exploring the magical connection between storytelling and nature.

The Challenge starts on 5th July and aims to keep children of all ages reading over the summer holidays. Children are encouraged to read up to 6 books before Saturday 13 September.

There are lots of reading formats to keep children interested. Fact books, stories, poetry, graphic novels, eBooks, joke books and audiobooks – it all counts as reading! Children will receive rewards for every book they read and when they complete the Challenge after their sixth book read, they will receive a certificate and a colourful wristband.

During our PSHE time, we are discussing the move to Year 1, identifying things we are looking forward to and any worries we might have. We will also go over all the best bits of our year together in Reception.



Phonics

The children will be working through Phases 3-5 in their Phonics groups.
Please spend time reflecting on the sounds in your child's Phonics reading book they take home on Tuesdays and Fridays.

Tricky words:

Please use the tricky word cards handed out at Parents Evening to guide your child's learning. These are words that cannot be sounded out so will need to be read on sight.

We appreciate your support in guiding your child's reading development.

What's happening in Year 1...

Year I thoroughly enjoyed our recent visit to Wisley and this has supported our learning in Science, where we have been learning about the parts of a plant and what plants need to grow. We have been closely monitoring our beans which have started to germinate and we will be potting these so that they can continue to grow.

We have really enjoyed learning about the different gardens in our key texts and have created some beautiful descriptive writing.

The children have been revisiting the four countries in the UK and their capital cities and have been learning some interesting facts about each country.

In Maths, the children have been continuing to explore place value. We have also been thinking about money and recognising, comparing and making amounts, as well as solving problems relating to money. Please continue to practise these skills over the holidays.

Our Art and DT learning has been inspired by flowers. The children have been studying the work of Claude Monet and have been developing their paper crafting skills to create paper flowers.

In our PSHE lessons, we will be celebrating all of the children's achievements this year and the children will be preparing for their move to Year 2.

What's happening in Year 2...

Congratulations to the crews of the good ships Tawny, Snowy and Barn Owls. Everyone has successfully completed their pirate crew training and are now ready to up anchor and sail on to new adventures!
